Vast inequalities faced by women in the North of England exposed in report

Women in the North of England live shorter lives, work more hours for less pay, are more likely to be an unpaid carer, and more likely to live in poverty than women in other regions of England, according to new research published today.

Men's health: The lives of men in our communities

Men in the most deprived areas in England live nearly 10 years fewer than those in the least deprived. It is clear working in partnership is the key to addressing men's health – and councils are ideally placed to lead and foster that.

<u>Delivering with dignity: A framework for strengthening commissioning and provision of healthcare services for people seeking asylum</u>

Our report, Delivering with dignity: A framework for strengthening commissioning and provision of healthcare services for people seeking asylum, finds that people seeking asylum in England often have complex health needs and yet face significant barriers to accessing timely, quality, and appropriate healthcare.

<u>Virtual wards operational framework</u>

This framework supports consistency across the NHS and the relevant goals in line with the Year 2 urgent and emergency care (UEC) recovery plan and the 2024/25 priorities and operational planning guidance: maintaining virtual ward capacity and optimising occupancy so it is consistently above 80%.

Killer tactics from tobacco, alcohol, and unhealthy food and drink industries

This report, developed by Action on Smoking and Health, Obesity Health Alliance and Alcohol Health Alliance, highlights the common strategies used by the tobacco, alcohol and unhealthy food and drink industries to delay and undermine public health policies in order to protect their business models. The report sets out the serious health harms caused by these unhealthy products as well as the high levels of public support for protecting health policy from the influence of industry.

Just living and coping

The cost-of-living crisis has had a profound impact on people with mental health problems, with many struggling to get by day-to-day at the expense of their health. Just living and coping draws together research commissioned by Mind to explore the impact of the cost-of-living crisis. The Centre's researchers heard from 500 people across England and Wales, many of whom already had mental health problems.

Investigating the impact of loneliness and social isolation on health

Loneliness is increasing in the UK. The Office for National Statistics reports that across Great Britain 8% of adults state they feel lonely often or always. Alongside concerns about the negative effects on society, there has been an increasing interest in the links between loneliness and health. The WHO Commission on Social Connection and the US Surgeon General have both publicly called for loneliness to be treated as a public health priority.

10 million being let down by mental health prevention plans

UK teenagers get two-thirds of their calories from ultra-processed foods – new study

Generations of young women have been bombarded with weight loss medications – 'skinny jabs' are just the latest

"I couldn't stop being sick. My side and my back were hurting and I just felt like my body was totally shutting down." That's how one woman described the side effects of weight loss injections she'd bought off-label in a BBC investigation. Her experience is far from uncommon. Medics in the UK are even reporting that young girls are ending up in A&E as a result of taking these products illicitly.
