<u>Effectiveness of Horticultural Therapy in Older Patients With Dementia: A Meta-Analysis Systemic</u> Review

Horticultural therapy has been found to have a significantly positive impact on the cognitive function, depression status, ADL, and quality of life of older patients with dementia.

<u>Attitudes of Nursing Home Managers Regarding Cognitively Stimulating Activities in People With</u> Dementia: A Multicentre Cross-Sectional Study

Representatives of 64 facilities completed the survey. Almost all stated to have implemented cognitively stimulating (CS) activities. Cognitive exercises (98%), physical and relaxation exercises (98%) and reminiscence therapy (95%) were most often used. The majority (96%) thought that CS activities could support people with dementia in maintaining their cognitive functions and that nurses should have a key role in the implementation of CS activities. More than half believed that regular CS activities were easy to implement alongside routine nursing

<u>Treating eyesight issues could prevent one in five dementia cases, study finds</u>

Up to one in five cases of dementia in older people might be avoided if problems with eyesight are prevented or treated, research has suggested. A new study, <u>published in the journal Jama Ophthalmology</u>, suggests up to 19% of dementia cases in older people could be attributed to vision impairments.

Light pollution at night may increase risk of Alzheimer's, study finds

New research claims that exposure to outdoor light at night may increase the prevalence of Alzheimer's disease, especially in people under the age of 65. The researchers who conducted the study, funded by a National Institutes of Health grant and published in the journal Frontiers in Neuroscience on Friday, said they have found correlations between areas of the US with excessive exposure to artificial light at night and the prevalence of Alzheimer's disease.

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Sports concussions in non-athletes not linked to long-term cognitive effects

The impact of concussion while playing sport is different in those who don't play professionally, according to new research. The collaborative study between the University of Oxford, University of Exeter, UNSW Sydney, and Harvard University, suggests sports-related concussions (SRC) may not be associated with long-term cognitive risks for non-professional athletes. In fact, study participants who had experienced an SRC had better cognitive performance in some areas than those who had never suffered a concussion, pointing to potential protective effects of sports participation. Published in The Journal of Neurology, Neurosurgery and Psychiatry (JNNP), the research reveals that individuals who reported experiencing any SRC during their lifetime had a marginally better cognitive performance than those who reported no concussions.
